A Park Bench For Joey!

As families gather around their Thanksgiving tables this year to give thanks, one North Buffalo family prepares a feast of friends to join them in a "Turkey Bowl!"

Cheryl and Vince Panzarella of North Buffalo take their son's love for Football and continues a tradition he started long before his untimely death in 2009. Their son, Joseph B. Panzarel-

Joseph B. Panzarella passed away suddenly of an apparent heart attack in his sleep at home. He was a student at St. Joseph's Collegiate Institute, playing for the Marauders football team and studying business management and met

working part-time. Every year, "Joey" would gather all his friends to Delaware Park on Thanksgiving Day morning and have a pick-up football game behind the Park's Juicery stand off of Meadow

Drive rain or shine. For 15 years now, the tradition continues with close to 100 sometimes showing up, including his best friend, Connor Gallagher and his family.

Sometimes under cloudy skies or an early morning rain, the Panzarella's welcome all his friends from his days at St. Mark's Parish and the North Buffalo Community that Joey had met while growing up and

playing Sports in Shoshone Park. At 12 years old, Joey was a catcher for the New York Yankees Major Boys team in the Hertel North Park Youth Baseball League in the early 1980's. He made lots of friends in the Park like Alex Anzalone, Jimmy Boyack, Owen Doyle and the Lepovich twins, Brad and Brett.

Since his death, Vince and Cheryl have set up a Foundation in his name, the "Joseph B. Panzarella Foundation" through St. Mark's Parish where they award a deserving eighth grade graduate student for exemplifying the life that their son tried to serve and help both in School and in the Community. At Graduation every year, the list has grown to include many North Buffalo students who have attended the Woodward Avenue School.

Vince Panzarella writes on a recent Facebook Post:

"Over the years, I have come to understand the true value of friendship and how easily it can be overshadowed by the demands of daily life. Observing Joey's friends gather gives me great satisfaction as it reflects your willingness to take a moment to reconnect with those you may not see as often as you like."

A heartfelt message that is presented along with hot coffee or chocolate and some fresh baked goods before the Turkey Bowl.

"We wanted to keep this going for Joey," said Connor Gallagher, "in honor of his friendship, at last year's Turkey Bowl. "This is what he would have wanted."

This year, Cheryl, Vince and their friends will be wishing a happy 35th heavenly birthday to their son and announcing a plan to add something to Delaware Park in Joey's memory. With the help of the City of Buffalo, the Panzarella's are asking their friends to help in the purchase of a park bench in Joey's honor to place in this area of Delaware Park. "If anyone wishes to contribute to the cost of a bench for my son," said Panzarella, all funds can be made payable to the JBP Foundation.'

6 Juveniles Damage Property At "The Terrace" On Lincoln Parkway

North Buffalo November 24, 2025

Amherst Street - Victim states she was walking down the street when defendant did approach her brandishing what appeared to be a black pocket knife and stated, Drop the bag, I'll kill you b***h," in an attempt to take without permission her bookbag causing her to fear for her safety.

November 22, 2025

Amherst Street - Complainant reports that the defendant stole \$164.49 worth of merchandise from TOPS. While attempting to stop the defendant, the complainant was punched and spat on repeatedly by the defendant. Upon of-ficers arrival, the defendant also punched a patrol officer in the face. Is Social Security Really A "Good Deal?" - Ask Rusty

Dear Rusty: You've said in the past that most people recoup their SS contributions within five years of starting benefits, thus Social Security "is an exceptionally good deal." Your calculation is correct but misleading; if it were not, SS would have been insolvent long ago. I will, in fact, get "my" contributions back in about five years, but my employer's contributions will take another five years, and that is money that my employer could have been paying me, so they are really "my" contributions. But even that ignores the time value of money. I did a calculation as if my contributions, along with those of my employer, were invested in an account earning 5% per year. That would provide me the equivalent of SS income for 24 years,

approximately what my life expectancy was when I retired. So, it's not a bad deal, but it is hardly exceptional. It is roughly the equivalent of me investing that money throughout my career and using the total to buy an annuity.

Of course, Social Security does have the advantage of certainty, at least until it goes broke. My portfolio would not earn a steady 5% every year, though that is at the low end of what financial managers would expect over a long period. And it does force people to save, many of whom would otherwise make no provision for retirement. Signed: Realistic Senior

Dear Realistic: Thanks very much for your feedback on my previous article. I think it's important to draw

a distinction for SS contributions made by an employer, because that is not money the individual personally pays, but rather an obligation for employers to help fund the Social Security program. Without that federal obligation, it is doubtful that employers would, instead, provide employees with equivalent additional compensation, so the thought that these are really your contributions is not a fair assessment. Indeed, they are contributions which happen to be tied to your earnings level (to a cap), for which employers receive relief on their corporate income tax, and likely would not make if not required by law.

As you have noted, Social Security has the advantage of certainty, something which is lacking when it comes to investing the equivalent amounts in the financial markets. And, as you have hinted, there exists a substantial failure by future American retirees to save adequately for their retirement, a problem well known in most financial circles. Thus, the certainty of Social Security makes it a crucial part of everyone's retirement planning – and it will be there! Despite all the angst attributed to the current financial issues facing the program, there is little doubt that Social Security is here to stay. The question is – what reform is needed to make the

program fully solvent for generations of future Americans? The Association of Mature American Citizens (AMAC) has developed a proposal to sensibly reform Social Secu-

rity and avoid the currently projected 2033 date that the SS Trust Funds are expected to be depleted (which will necessitate an across-the-board cut for everyone).
