A Legend Remembered



Thomas More Wolf. January 21, 1963 - December 4, 2024.

It's Christmas time. The most wonderful time of the year when families gather and share the love for the season. The spirit of giving and receiving grabs a hold of us now and reminds us all of just how blessed we are to be able to show our love for others.

Last weekend, hundreds of families shopped the many small businesses along Hertel Avenue while they waited for the lighting of the giant Christmas tree at St. Margaret's Church. Santa and Mrs. Claus arrived to greet all the children and songs from a choir filled the air.

On a Bills Victory Monday, Mike Schopp and the Bulldog from Sports Radio WGR 55 were broadcasting live from Dash's Market at Hertel and Starin, asking for donations of non-perishable foods and warm hats, scarves and gloves for the needy at the Buffalo City Mission.

"We have always tried to give back and support our community any way we can," said Dash's Store Manager Joe Catalano over the air, inside the Market. "We've been in business over 100 years and we have this community to thank."

But the biggest gift to North Buffalo this year has to be the new Thomas Smith Athletic Center that's now open and being used for several sports events including football. This past Monday night, while teams from the Delaware Soccer Club were practicing for their season, one North Buffalo family gathered on the anniversary of the sudden death of Thomas More Wolf.

A former board member of the Hertel North Park Youth Baseball League and longtime coach in Shoshone Park, Tom Wolf passed away on December 4th of last year and his loss has been greatly felt by

anyone who has ever played or coached in the League since the early 1980's. He was 61.

A fierce advocate for the League, Wolf assured everyone of fair play and equal op-

portunities for both boys and girls in the Park. A lover of the game of baseball and the St. Louis Cardinals MLB team, he coached his three sons, William, Matthew and Hugh all play the game he loved and then stayed on to assist the HNPYBL board of directors carry out the duties of running this almost 70 year old League until just before the Covid season of 2020.

A huge plaque has been created with his name and contributions to the League to be displayed inside the Athletic Center for all to read. The Plaque reads:

He leaves behind a legacy, defined by loyalty, generosity and an unwavering belief in the power of youth sports. As a devoted coach of the Cardinals, Tom poured his heart into every practice, every season and every young player he mentored.

His leadership extended far beyond wins and losses-he built confidence, fostered teamwork and created an environment where kids felt valued both on and off the field. To many, he wasn't just a coach; he was a steady presence, a role model and a source of encouragement who inspired players to give their best in everything they did.

Tom's dedication to the Hertel North Park Youth Baseball organization ran deep. As a passionate advocate and long-time board member, he worked tirelessly to strengthen the program and ensure that every child, regardless of circumstance, had the opportunity to experience the joy of baseball. His commitment to the community was rooted in a simple but powerful belief: the game he loved could shape lives, build character and bring people together.

Through countless hours of service, planning and handson involvement, he helped the league grow into a place where families felt supported and young lives thrived. Though he is no longer with us, Tom's spirit lives on in the fields he tended, the players he mentored and the families he uplifted. His legacy of compassion and dedication will continue through ongoing efforts to help families financially, allowing more children the chance to play the game that meant so much to him.

May he rest in peace, knowing that his influence will echo through generations. And may every crack of the bat, cheer from the stands, and every smile on a young player's face serve as a tribute to the remarkable man he was.

January 21, 1963- December 4, 2024

A very jovial and cheerful man, Tom was a friendly face to everyone who came in contact with him. He took an interest in all his players on the diamonds and in their schoolwork. He worked with all boys individually, helping improve their swing of a bat or a pitch hrown. He taught thousands of young athletes in the Park and stayed in touch with them once they attended high school. He helped shape the young life of Alexander "Gator" Johnson as a 12 year old before he went on to attend Hutch Tech and get drafted by the

Cincinnati Reds.

A moment of prayer was given by Father Richard "Duke" Zajac, a longtime family friend, in remembrance of Tom before the Hertel North Park Youth Baseball League was presented with a check from the Wolf family. "We thank Tom Wolf and his entire family for his dedication and contribution to this League and this Park," said Scott Gallivan, vice-president of Hertel North Park, representing the League. "He will always be remembered."



About Remarrying And Benefits From An Ex-Spouse - Ask Rusty

Dear Rusty: I am almost 57, divorced after a 14-year marriage. My former spouse is 15 years older than I and made significantly more money than me. I am required to retire from my job at age 60 but expect to keep working in some capaci-

I have a girlfriend of a similar age to me. She did not earn as much as her former husband as she mainly raised their children. She is also divorced from an older spouse who made more money than she did. I am trying to figure out if we will be penalized if we marry, or if it matters if we wait until after we reach 60 years of age. Can I claim my own benefits when I become eligible at 62,

then claim survivor benefits later, whenever my former spouse passes? Is that affected if, or when, I remarry? I do not want to give up my potential survivor benefits from my ex-spouse. Are those affected if I remarry?

If I understand correctly, if I remarry even after 60, we would both forfeit divorced spousal benefits, is that right? Given that my girlfriend's former spouse probably made more money than I, would she be forfeiting her former spousal benefits if we were to marry, even after age 60?

Lastly, I am considering retiring abroad as an expat. Any suggestions about how that would affect our Social Security benefits? Signed: Starting Over

Dear Starting Over: With certain exceptions, benefits from a living exspouse cannot be collected if you remarry (regardless of your age when you remarry). So, from what you've shared, whenever you remarry both you and your new wife will forfeit eligibility for benefits from your respective ex-spouses while they are living (FYI, there are exceptions for those who are disabled).

However, the rules are different for a surviving ex-spouse: if you remarry before age 60, you will forfeit your surviving ex-spouse benefit. But if you remarry after age 60, you retain eligibility to collect survivor benefits from a deceased former spouse. So, if you and your girlfriend remarry after you are both age 60, you will both still be able to claim survivor benefits based on your former spouses' records.

And, yes, it is possible for you to initially claim your own SS retirement benefit at 62 and claim your surviving ex-spouse benefit later (after your former spouse dies). Provided you remarry after age 60 you do not lose that option, but if you were to claim a surviving ex-spouse benefit before reaching your full retirement age (FRA), the monthly payment amount would be reduced (all SS benefits taken before FRA are reduced).

Note too, that if you plan to continue working after you are first eligible for SS benefits, Social Security has an "earnings test" which limits how much you can earn from working while collecting early benefits. The limit changes yearly (for 2025 it is \$23,400) and if exceeded, SS will take back \$1 in benefits for every \$2 you are over the limit. And, as you likely know, claiming at age 62 will also mean a benefit payment of about 30% less than available at your FRA of 67. So, if you plan to work after age 62 and plan to claim early SS, you should take the "earnings test" into consideration. FYI, the earning test no longer applies after you reach your full retirement age.

Now, regarding retiring overseas, be aware that Social Security has limits on where you can collect U.S. Social Security benefits. I suggest you use Social Security's Payments Abroad Screening Tool to find out if benefits are payable wherever you plan to retire abroad.

Kearns Warns Drivers of Major DMV Point System Overhaul

As 2026 approaches, Erie County Clerk Michael P. Kearns is urging motorists to prepare for significant and far-reaching changes to the New York State Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV) driv-

er point system. These reforms, adopted in late $202\overline{4}$, are designed to more quickly identify high-risk motorists and improve road safety across New York State (NYS).

"With these new rules taking effect, it's important for every New York driver to understand how points work and how they can affect your driving privileges," said Clerk Kearns. "If you accumulate too many points, it can cause your license to be suspended or revoked. And points on a license can also impact what you pay for insur-

ance. Currently, drivers face a possible pension if they accumulate 11 points within 18 months. However, un-

der the new rules, drivers can face suspension with 10 points within 24 months. This means drivers will have a lower point threshold limit, before facing penalties or possible suspension.

Many common vio-lations will now carry more points, making it easier to reach the 10-point threshold:

Speeding 1-10 mph over limit: increasing from 3 to 4 points

Using a cell phone while driving: increasing from 5 to 6 points

Failure to yield to a pedestrian: increasing from 3 to 5 points

Reckless driving or passing a stopped school bus: will now result in 8 points, up from 5.

Speeding in construction zones is a particular focus under the new law. Violators who exceed the speed limit in a construction zone will now result in 8 points regardless of speed.
"This is one of the most dramatic changes in the new law," Kearns noted. "Construction workers deserve to be protected, and the state is sending a clear message."

Drivers will also see points added for violations that previously never carried none:

Equipment violations: 1 point each

U-turns: Illegal points

Obstructing traffic: 2 points

Failure to move over for emergency vehicles: now 3 points

These changes originate from Governor Kathy Hochul's 2023 State of the State initiative, were formally proposed in the July 2024 New York State Register, adopted in November 2024, and will take effect in February 2026.

A major key change took effect in January 2025a for impaired-driving reform. The number of impaired driving convictions that result in a lifetime license revocation has been reduced from five DUI convictions to four. "If you've been convicted of driving drunk four times, what the state is saying is you shouldn't have a

license and shouldn't be on the road," said Ke-arns. "And to every innocent victim of a drunk driver — I don't know anyone who disagrees with that."

These reforms aim to identify dangerous driving behavior earlier, increase accountability for repeat offenders, and strengthen protections for families on New York's roadways. "Driv-ing is a responsibility," said Kearns. "Understanding the rules of the road as well as the new point system helps keep your license in good standing and helps keep our roadways safer for everyone."


