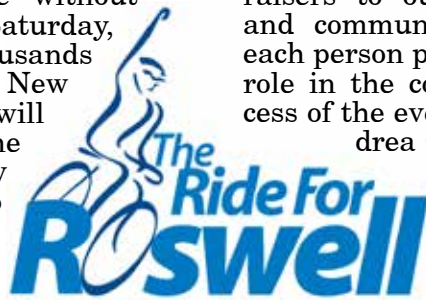

**Eric Williams Comes Home!**



The 13U 716 Patriots team and Manager Eric Williams traveled to Shoshone Park and North Buffalo last weekend to play in the 1st Annual Shoshone Showdown Tournament. Both Shoshone and McCarthy Parks were needed to show off some talented Baseball teams hosted by Ron Pilat and the 3 & 2 Baseball School at the new Tom Smith Athletic Center from Thursday to Sunday in front of many exuberant fans from across WNY.

This week, before we give you scores from last weekend's games in the House Divisions of the North Buffalo Baseball Softball League on the Don Morris Fields, I'd like to explain what happened to me on Saturday.

It was a beautiful day, except for a cold wind blowing through the Park as I checked on the status of many games being played since 9:30 in the morning. I was told a "Shoshone ShowDown" Tournament was being played throughout the weekend and the teams were using the 90ft Diamond in the far corner of the Park. I notice the new dugouts on both sides of the diamond, complete with the new roofs that had been installed during the winter.

As I approach homeplate to get a better view of this particular game, all of a sudden, I hear my name, "Bill Snyder" being yelled from someone on the diamond. I stopped in my tracks and quickly tried to find out who had seen me by looking for a familiar face. It didn't work. The man called my name again and suddenly I was almost scared to take another step.

Quickly, the inning came to an end and the team on the diamond headed towards their dugout. The other team took the field and I was still in wonder of where this voice came from. A man stepped towards me on the other side

of the fence and gave me a big smile.

"I remember you," he said pretty loud so others could hear. "You covered me when I played here as a kid in the Hertel North Park League and Shoshone Football."

He quickly introduced himself as Eric Williams, the manager of the 716 Patriots, playing in this Tournament of 13 year old Boys from Clarence, NY. I immediately knew the name and remembered when he played. It was in 1982 and I was just starting this job as a sports writer for the North Buffalo Rocket.



He played Baseball for the Cincinnati Reds and coach Sam Chianta, a legendary figure in North Buffalo Sports who helped thousands of neighborhood boys grow up and excel in not just baseball but in football as well. In the winter months, Chianta was an assistant coach for many years in Shoshone Park Football.

"I have all your stories," he continued talking to me about how glad he was to see me. I was totally surprised by his attention to me even between an inning of this game. The Patriots took the field and got ready for play. I didn't ask him if his team was winning right now so I never found out, but he was more excited to see me instead of coaching his team.

I snapped a photo of

the Patriots and here is who they are left to right: Carter Greiner, Coach Eric Williams, Damon Covert, Parker Drysdale, Samuel Hale, Maximus Williams, Graham Wilkinson, Seamus Luck, River Horvatits, Jacob Hoestermann, coach Tyler Drysdale, and Dylan Greiner.

The 56 year old Williams has been coaching the Team for six years and is a senior counselor in the Department of Juvenile Justice for NYState 32 years. He grew up on Wallace Avenue and attended Campus North and McKinley High School where he was named All WNY in Baseball and All-High for the Macks.

"It's very nostalgic to be able to come back here and remember playing on this field where I was once an MVP and Champion when I was just 13 years old," he said later. "My son Max is just a utility player on this team but he loves the game just like I did back in the day."

This is All-Star week for all the teams in the House League in all Divisions. Wednesday night, every team in the girls divisions of North Buffalo Baseball Softball were represented in the four Divisions of Girls Softball, Majors, Triple A, Double A and Rookie. Thursday, Boys were selected from each team to play against each other in their All-Star night. It's a great night for families to come out and watch their sons or daughters play against some great talent.

Jack Dwyer, Alex Mulhern and Rick Balsano were on the mound for the Mariners while Ben Wood and RJ Parrett both hit solo homeruns to lead the team over the Orioles, 7-5. Clara Siller blasted a two run homerun in the first inning, knocking in teammate Cali Wild for a Purple Eagle win over the Spartans at McCarthy.

Justus Woods had two hits to lead the Athletics to an 8-4 win over the Twins in Rookie Boys. Charlie Rush doubled in the bottom of the fifth inning and helped lead the Reds to a 12-10 win over the Phillies in Major Boys Saturday morning. Serafina Sweeney knocked in teammate Abigail McCarthy in the fifth inning to lead the Bonnies to a 4-3 win over the Bears.

Ryder Lane, Keon Pawloski and Max Capaccio helped lead the Braves to a big win over the Cubs in Major Boys. Tucker Seneca and Henry Johnson were stellar on the basepaths. Kealon Sinnott and Leo Lorentz both homered and Steven Mingle tripled to lead the Double AA Dodgers to a 4-3 victory over the Brewers.



### Defendant Goes Postal At Niagara Street McDonalds

**North Buffalo**  
**June 7, 2026**

Delaware Avenue - At 1995 Delaware Avenue officers and Delta detective executed a search warrant signed by the honorable judge presiding. Officers recovered the evidence hereto: hundreds of rounds of various ammunition and dozens of high capacity magazines.

**June 6, 2026**

Kenmore Avenue - Victim states defendant did strike her in the face causing a laceration to her left cheek.

**June 5, 2026**

Hertel Avenue - Subject took miscellaneous items (value \$532.00) without permission and passed all points of purchase.

**West Side**

The call was about a person possibly down in a black Buick sedan, a new York registered vehicle. 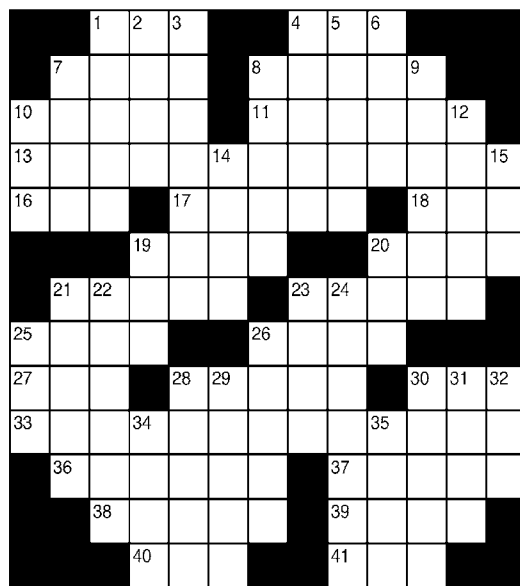

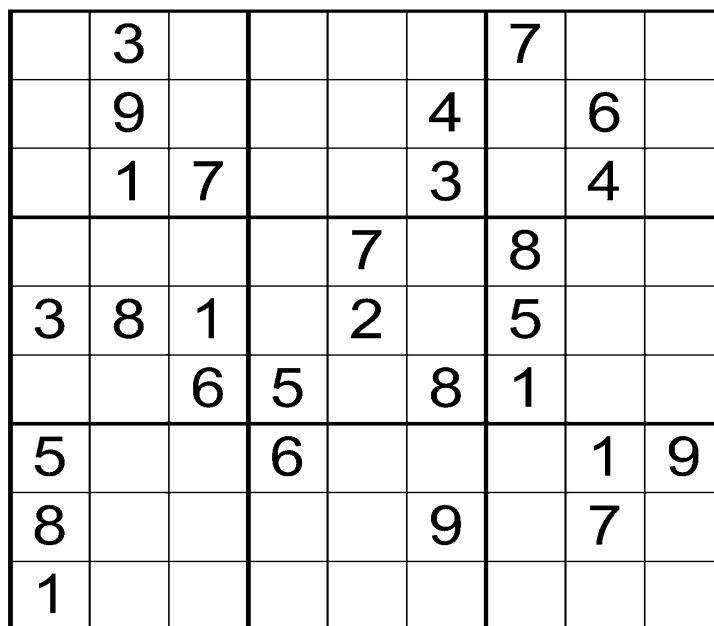

### Why Don't We Have A Minimum Social Security Benefit? - Ask Rusty

**Dear Rusty:** I think we should have a Social Security baseline of \$2,500 for each person. When I retire, my Social Security benefit will not be enough to survive. There are many of us who worked low paying jobs all our lives because we raised families and only started saving later in life. Considering all the money our government wastes on other countries and welfare programs for people who have not worked, it seems unfair that they will not reward those of us who contributed to society all our lives. **Signed: Needs More Social Security.**

**Dear Needs More:** For information, the concept of a "minimum" Social Security benefit is not new and, indeed, already exists – but it is one which few beneficiaries qualify for. The so-called "special minimum benefit" was meant to lift low-earning workers above the poverty line, but less than 32,000 SS beneficiaries (out of about 59 million retirees) currently qualify. That's because Social Security's benefit formula turns out to be more generous because it is based on lifetime earnings (wages), while the "special minimum benefit" program is based on consumer prices.

That causes the SS benefit formula to provide a higher SS benefit than is provided by the "special minimum benefit" option. In other words, people get a higher benefit because their SS benefit is based upon their actual lifetime earnings vs. an artificially created special minimum benefit. In short, the existing SS benefit formula usually provides more than the established "special minimum benefit."

The SS benefit program is based on each person's average monthly income over their lifetime. However, it is very important to understand that the program is also designed to provide a higher monthly benefit to those with a lower lifetime income. Thus, the percentage of "replacement income" for those with lower lifetime earnings is more than it is for those with higher lifetime earnings. Typically, a lower-lifetime income person will get about 40% of their average pre-retirement monthly income as their Social Security benefit, whereas a higher-income person will get about 20% or less of their pre-retirement monthly average income. In this way, Social Security is already a "progressive" program. But it's important to understand also that Social Security, from its beginning, was never meant to provide 100% of a person's income needs in retirement. Thus, each beneficiary should plan to supplement their retirement income in other ways (such as retirement savings, investment income, working longer, working part-time, etc.).

Having said that, it is also important to know that Social Security is a completely self-sustaining program and not dependent on general public funding, which would make it more susceptible to political shenanigans (imagine giving re-election seeking politicians easy access to Social Security's separately held resources). While it is certainly true that the government spends freely on "welfare programs" for those who have not worked, Social Security is not a program which is dependent on government largesse. Rather, it is a benefit which is earned by working and contributing to the program, which provides retirement benefits based upon each person's average lifetime work income.

If you expect financial difficulties when you retire, I encourage you to visit this website sponsored by the National Council on Aging (www.benefitscheckup.org). Here you can enter your zip code and find many public programs which you might be eligible for where you live, including assistance with healthcare costs, housing, utilities, etc.

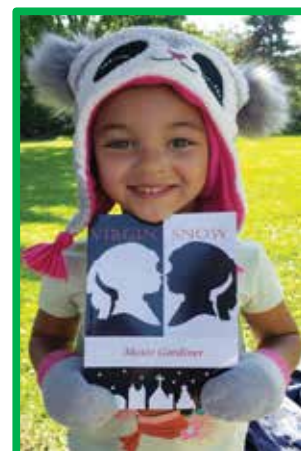

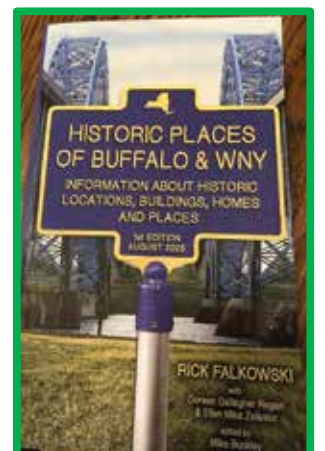

### Kearns Calls On Purple Heart Recipients To Be Honored

Erie County Clerk Michael P. Kearns will again honor veterans that have been bestowed the Purple Heart by adding their name to the William J. Donovan Purple Heart Recipients Book of Merit. Kearns is encouraging veterans who were awarded the Purple Heart or their surviving family members to submit their request to his office by August 1st in order to be added to the 2024 edition and be part of this year's ceremony.

Purple Heart veterans or their families must complete a short application that can be obtained online at [erie.gov/clerk/PurpleHeart-Form](http://erie.gov/clerk/PurpleHeart-Form) or by email at [salutes@erie.gov](mailto:salutes@erie.gov) as well as provide proof the award was issued. Those with additional questions can call the Erie County Clerk's office at 716-858-6787.

"I think it is important

to honor the brave men and women who have served and sacrificed for our Country. They deserve to be recognized and I am pleased we can maintain a record of our local military heroes at the Erie County Clerk's Office", stated Kearns.

Kearns established the William J. Donovan Purple Heart Recipients Book of Merit in 2018 and has committed to add to the book each year with new recipients, which is now in its sixth year. The book is named after Buffalo native and leading advocate for the Central Intelligence Agency, William J. Donovan. Donovan would receive three Purple Hearts during his service in the military, and would go on to heard the predecessor of the CIA, during World War II.

The complete volume of the William J. Donovan Purple Heart Book of Merit is on display



year-round at the Erie County Clerk's Office in Old County Hall located at 92 Franklin Street, Buffalo. It presently holds five hundred forty (540) names of those honored with the Purple Heart from Erie County.

The Purple Heart is the oldest military decoration awarded to members of the United States military who were wounded or killed while serving, on or after April 5, 1917. Originally called the Badge of Military Merit, the Purple Heart was created by George Washington on August 7, 1782. In addition to receiving a purple heart shaped award, the honoree's name and regiment were inscribed in a "Book of Merit" which was lost after the Revolutionary War and the award was largely forgotten until over 100 years later.

Kearns will recognize the William J. Donovan Purple Heart Recipients and honor all Purple Heart veterans during a ceremony on Wednesday, August 7th which also serves as National Purple Heart Day annually. Complete ceremony details will be made available as the event date approaches.

In addition, Old County Hall will be lit up purple, August 5-11th, in honor of Purple Heart Appreciation Day and in solemn recognition of all service members injured or killed in action.

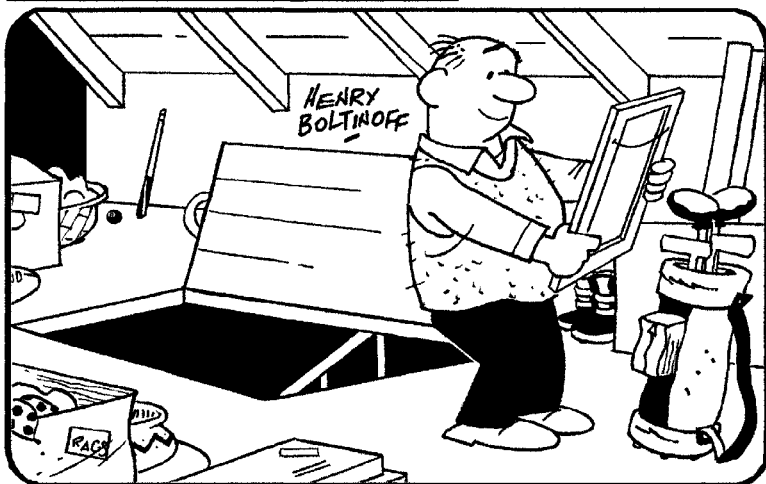

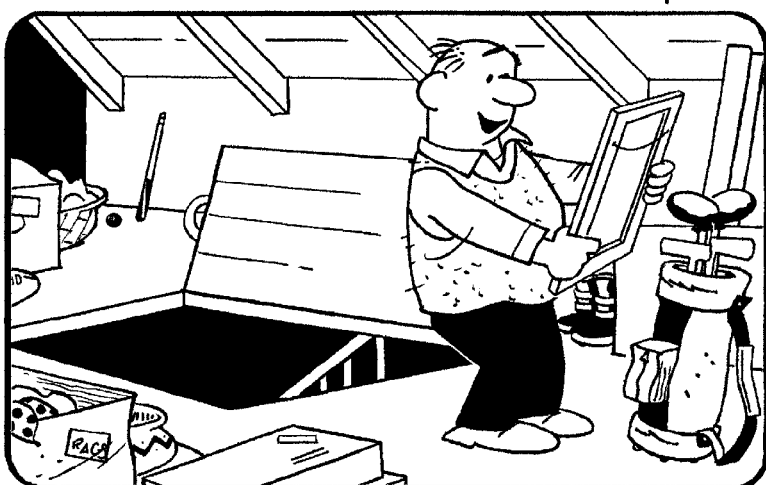

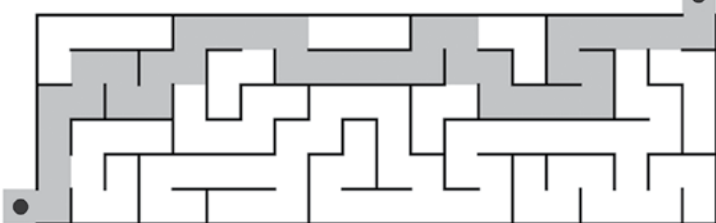
